What is open access (OA)?

- 1. Making content freely available online to read
 - Meaning your article can be read by anyone, anywhere (so long as they have an internet connection)
- 2. Making content reusable by third parties with little or no restrictions













Our definitions



Gold Open Access

- > Publication of the final article (Version of Record).
- Article is made freely available online, often but not always after payment of an article publishing charge (APC).

Green Open Access

Archiving / deposit of an (earlier version of an) article in a repository.

Hybrid/Full Open Access

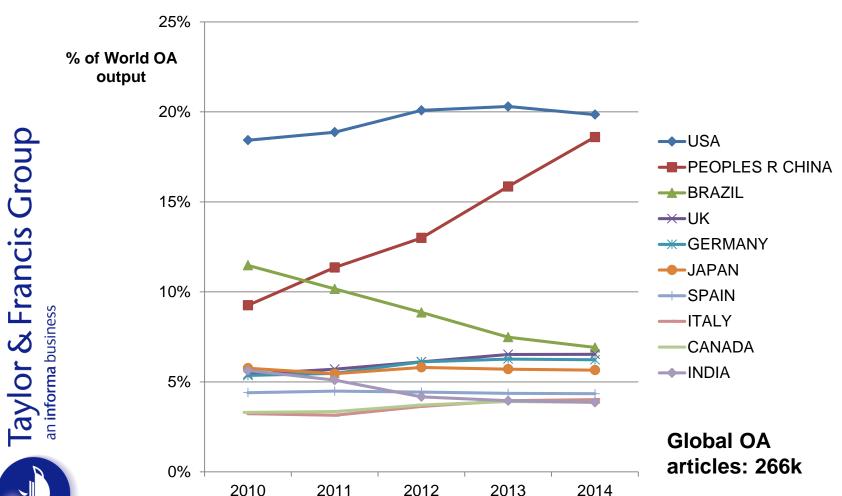








Top 10 countries by % of OA research output (full OA articles)

OA in Europe

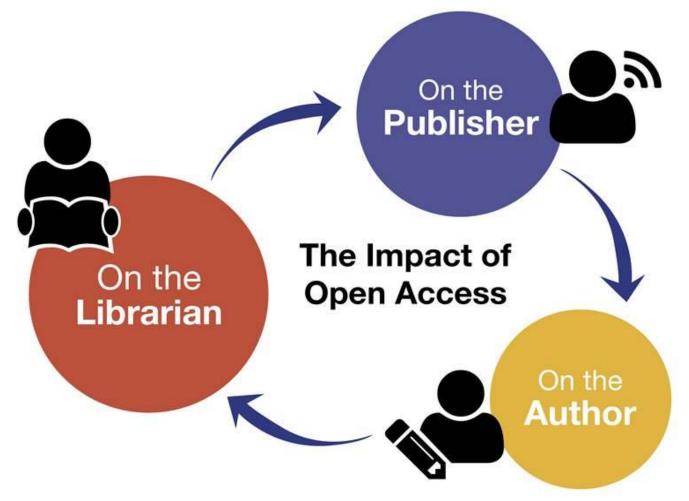
- ➤ **EU Competitiveness Council** all scientific papers should be 'freely available by 2020'
- Horizon 2020
 - APC funds made available
 - Gold or Green OA with 6 / 12 month embargoes permitted
- UK Strong funder mandates, supports both Gold and Green OA
- > Austria tending towards Gold OA as part of sales agreements
- ➤ Netherlands 60% of research to be OA by 2016, 100% by 2024
- Norway draft Ministry of Education and Research guidelines state a preference for Gold OA, target of 100% OA by 2020
- France strong preference for Green with a draft bill mandating max 6 months embargoes
- Rise of regional offset agreements pilot models
 - Open Science a talking point impact, ROI and broader engagement









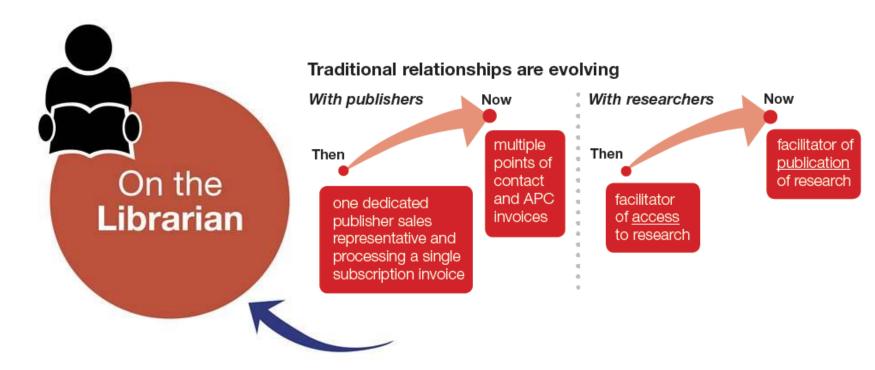

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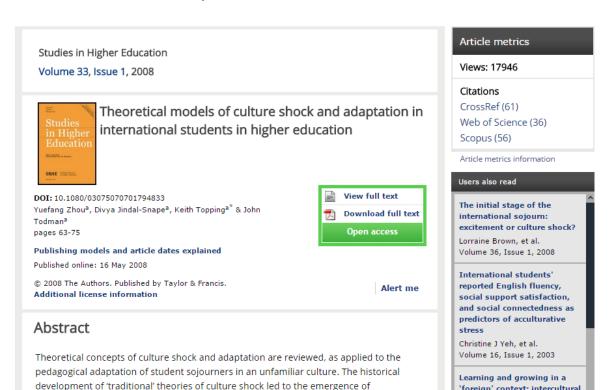






Increasing accessibility

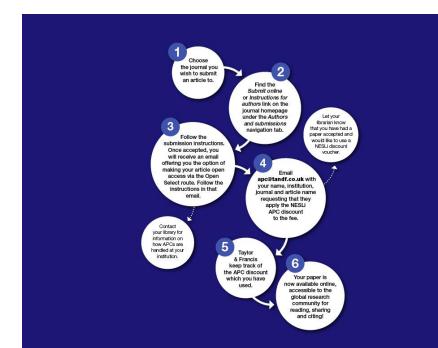
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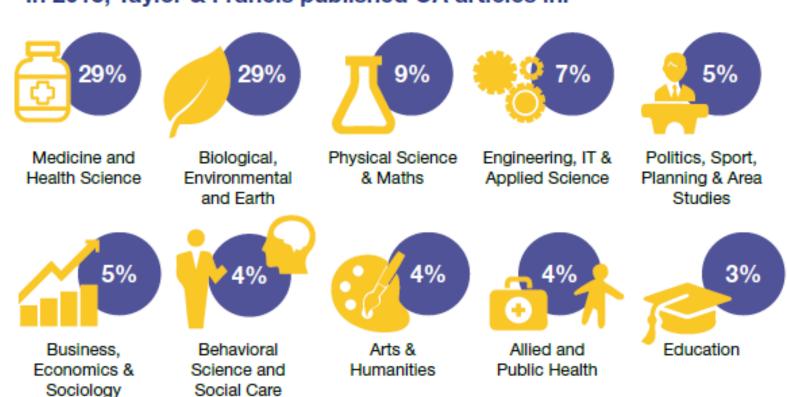
